Tips for structuring an essay

| Context | Contextualise: explain how the issue fits into the bigger picture | DON'T begin your discussion without giving any context or background information |
| Relevance | Answer the question and keep referring back to the title throughout your essay Be selective in choosing your arguments Tell the reader explicitly why something is relevant | DON'T forget the title. It is amazing how many people do! DON'T tell the whole story, including everything you know about the topic DON'T leave the reader to guess at connections you make in your head |
| Structure | Include an introduction and conclusion to frame your essay Structure points in a logical order Include one main idea in each paragraph | DON'T ignore the importance of introductions/conclusions for setting out/closing your arguments DON'T mix up content that should be in different places in the same paragraph/section DON'T try to cover too many ideas in one paragraph |
| Evidence | Support your claims with specific and appropriate evidence and examples Make sure there is a balance of critical discussion and supporting evidence | DON'T make claims or generalisations DON'T have all evidence and no discussion (e.g.copying from the internet or books, using long quotes with little or no discussion about their relevance) |
| Evaluation | Discuss, analyse and critique the evidence, looking at strengths and weaknesses, patterns and trends, connections and complexities | DON'T generalise or make assumptions based on personal experience |
| Language | Define any problematic key terms Be precise, clear and to the point Foster an academic style by: - using formal english (avoid slang and colloquialisms) - avoiding abbreviations and contractions - attempting an impersonal style - using nominalisation - being objective - hedging (using cautious language) - avoiding conjunctions at the start of sentences | DON'T present vague arguments, state the obvious or repeat information DON'T assume that your interpretation, and your reader's understanding of key terms, is the same |
